ONGOING PROGRAMS

Immigration: An Overview: Journey through South Australian immigration and contact history. Explore concepts of cultural diversity and identity.

60 minutes / Years 3-12

Life in Colonial South Australia: A focus on why early immigrants came to South Australia and on the life they created here. 60 minutes / Years R-7

Children in 19th Century South Australia: An exciting introduction to history through children's play, work, dress and education. 90 minutes / Years R-5

20th & 21st Century Immigration: Students are challenged to think critically about the concepts of multiculturalism and identity. 60 minutes / Years 7-12

The Impact of European Settlement on the Aboriginal Peoples of South Australia: A powerful and challenging role-play that examines South Australia's history from another perspective. Up to 2 hours / Years 5-12

Whose History? Examines how history is constructed and recorded, who is included and who is left out. 90 minutes / Years 3-10

Women in South Australia: A social history approach to explore and reflect on the lives of South Australian women. Ideal for students of Women's Studies. 60 minutes / Years 8-12
