

# Migration Museum

## Year 2002 Education Programs



Unique educational experiences for South Australian students and teachers.

The Migration Museum is a social history museum that tells the story of South Australia's immigration and settlement history.

It is situated on the site of the 1845 Native School Establishment, the place built to train the children of the Kurna people and other inland groups to work for the British as artisans and domestic servants.

The Museum is housed in what remains of the Destitute Asylum where Adelaide once hid its poor and homeless.

### REGULAR PROGRAMS

#### Immigration to South Australia

A walk-through tour that introduces students to ideas about cultural diversity and immigration and settlement history.  
Years 4-7

#### Life in Colonial South Australia

This program focuses on why our early settlers chose to migrate to South Australia and on the life they created here. It includes 'hands on' activities and discussion of artefacts of the working day.  
Years R-7

#### Germans in South Australia

This program looks at the history of German settlers and the enormous influence they had on South Australia. An excellent program for German language students.  
Years 5-7

#### Children in 19<sup>th</sup> Century South Australia

What was it like to be a child in 19<sup>th</sup> Century South Australia? An exciting and relevant introduction to history for young students. Includes 'hands on' activities using period costume, 19<sup>th</sup> century artefacts and games.  
Years R - 5

#### Cross Site Packages

#### When Smalls Were Large

A program that explores the way in which fashion has historically been used to define women's role in western society. In this 'white gloves' workshop students are able to handle items of historical costume to better understand how they were used to customise the body. A PowerPoint presentation informs the experience. 12 – 23 August

#### Body Art

The practice of decorating and marking the body is as popular today as it has ever been. Tattooing, piercing, painting, straight lacing and other methods of altering the body have been practised across time and cultures. Why? What part do pain and permanence play?
