- A 'small-scale preliminary experiment designed to check out the feasibility, effectiveness and potential outcomes ...'

- Feedback from stakeholders & higher ups

- Careful analysis of results to determine next steps

The South Australian Stories Survey Initiative invites anyone with a passion for South Australia's past to tell the History Trust more about what they are doing and why.

Last week I met with a group of enthusiasts to explore the challenges of generational renewal among the state's historical societies.

Typically, these societies hold local records and objects relating to a specific region and are run by volunteers who have dedicated decades to caring for these community collections so they can be handed to future generations.

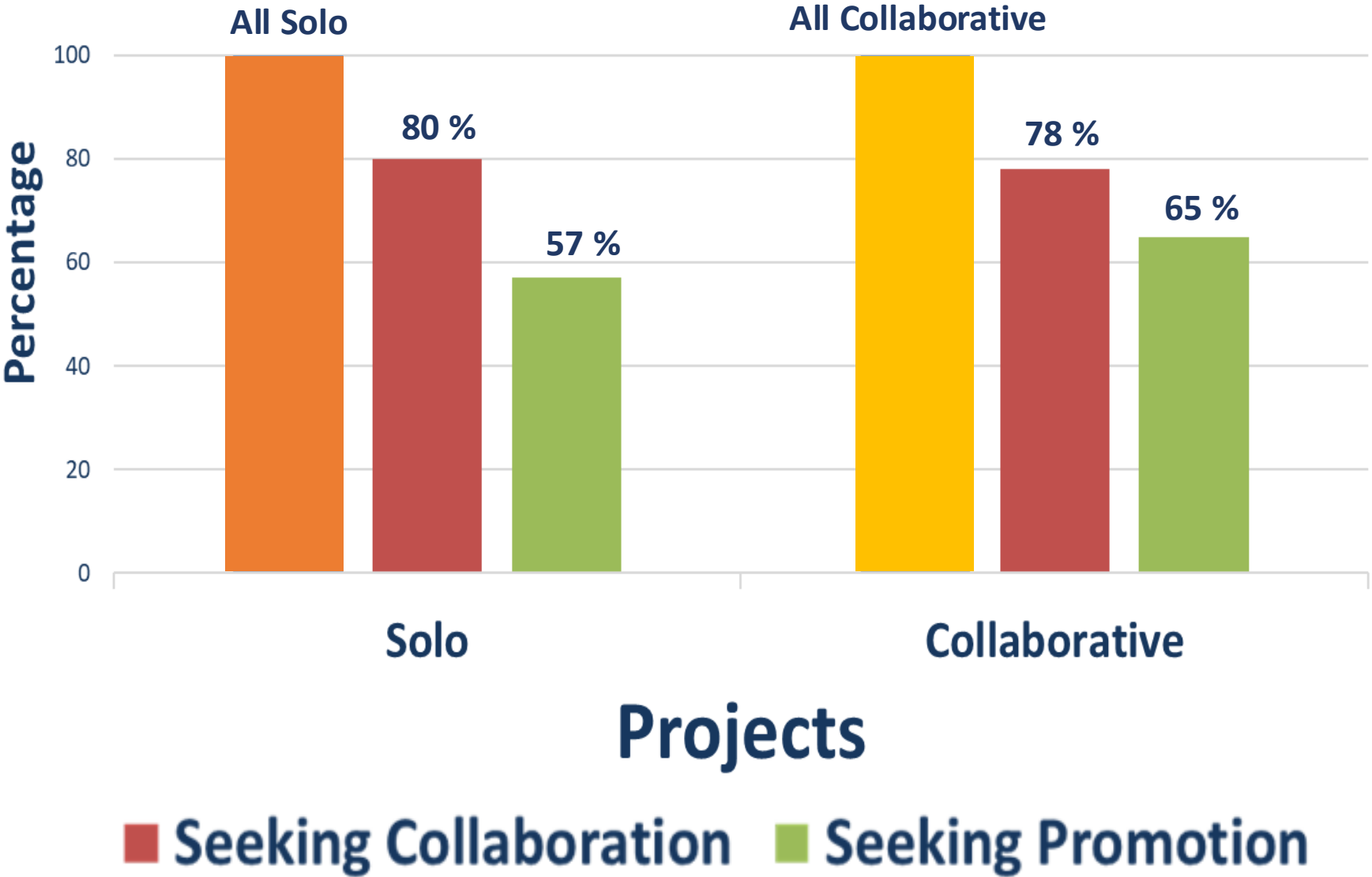
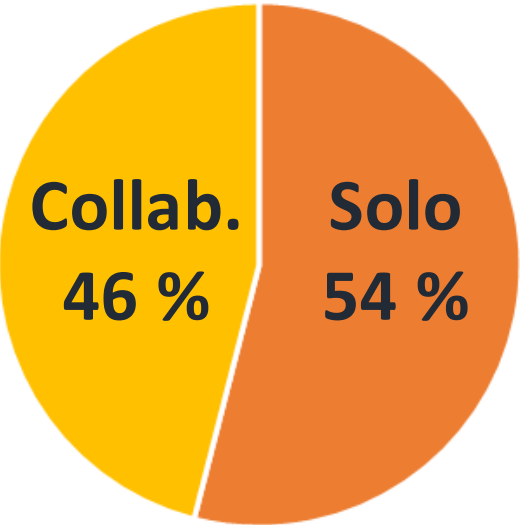

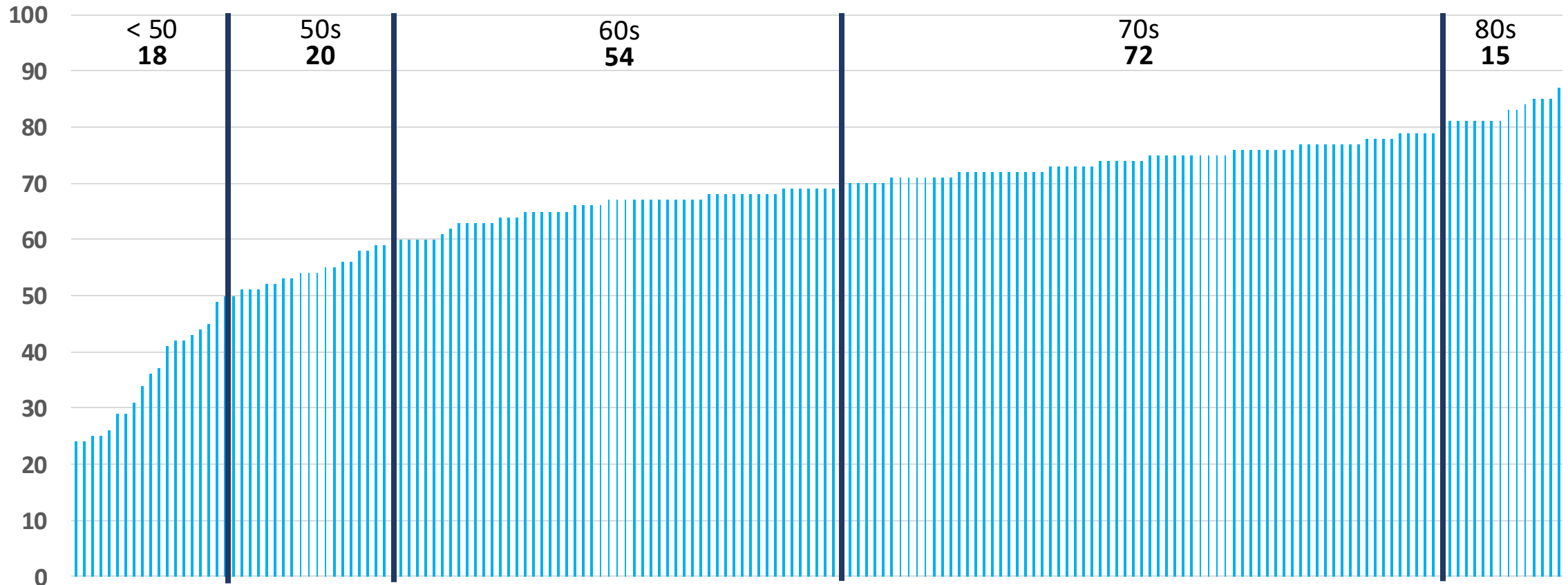

Demographics

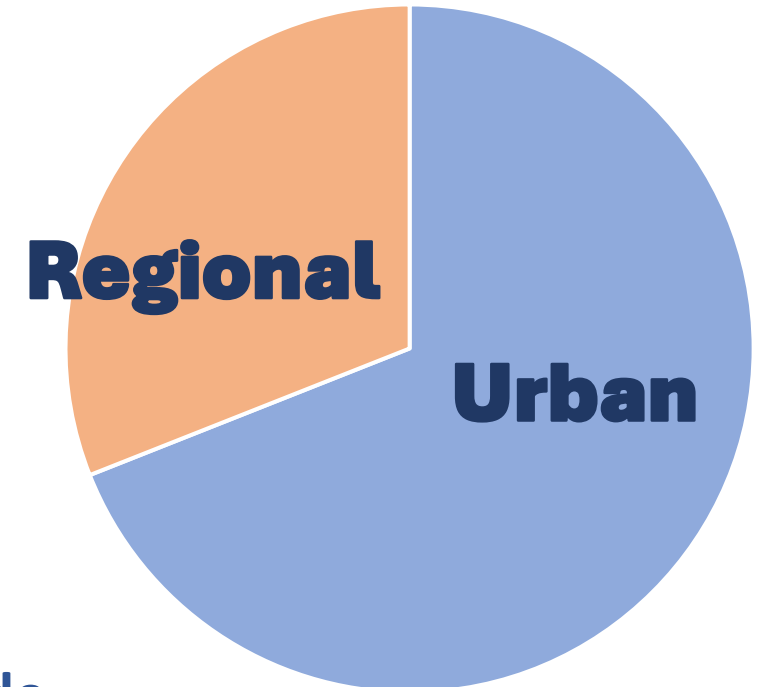
Age range 24 to 87 years (average age 66 years)



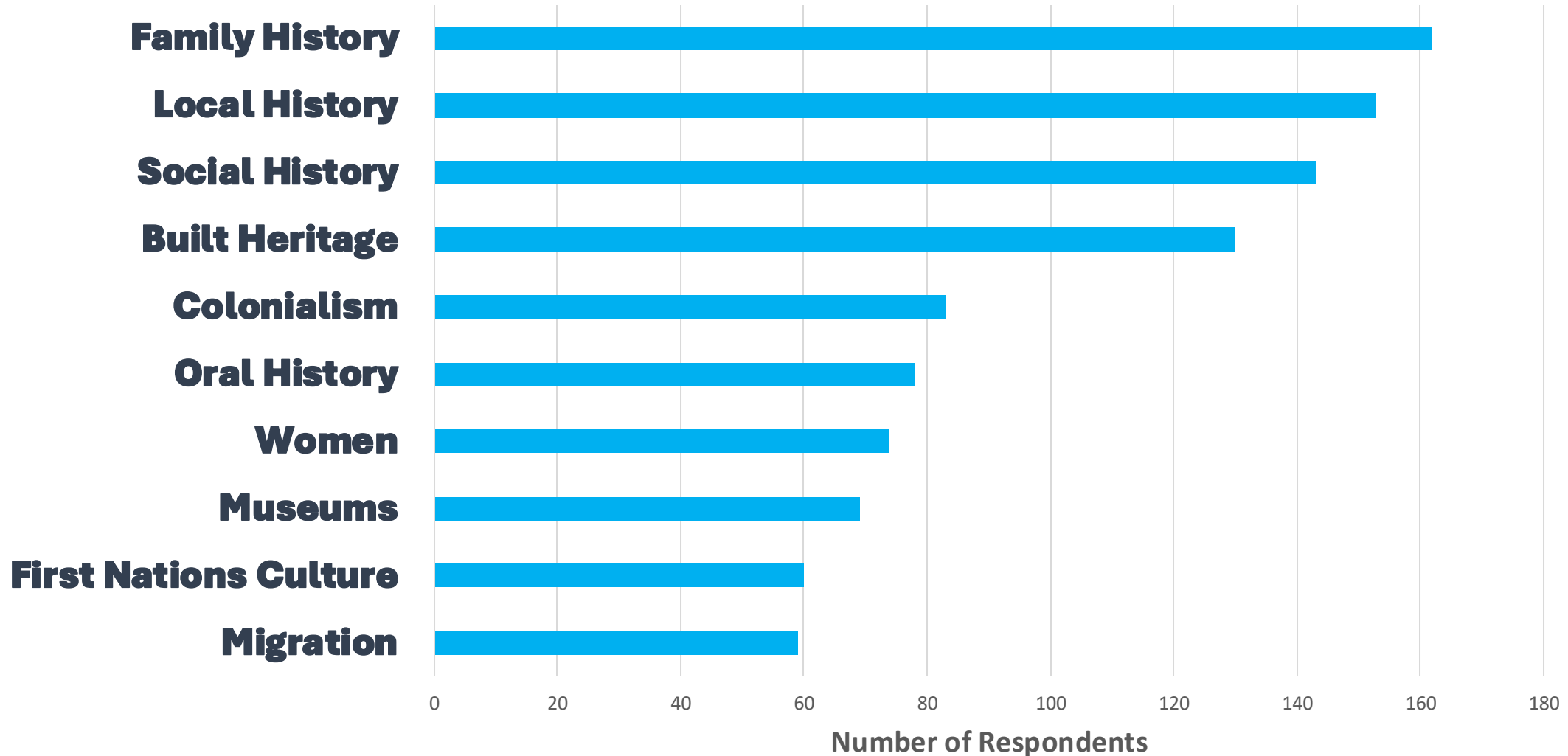
Demographics

- **96 %** South Australians
 - **50** different council districts
 - **69 %** reside in Adelaide & surrounding suburbs.

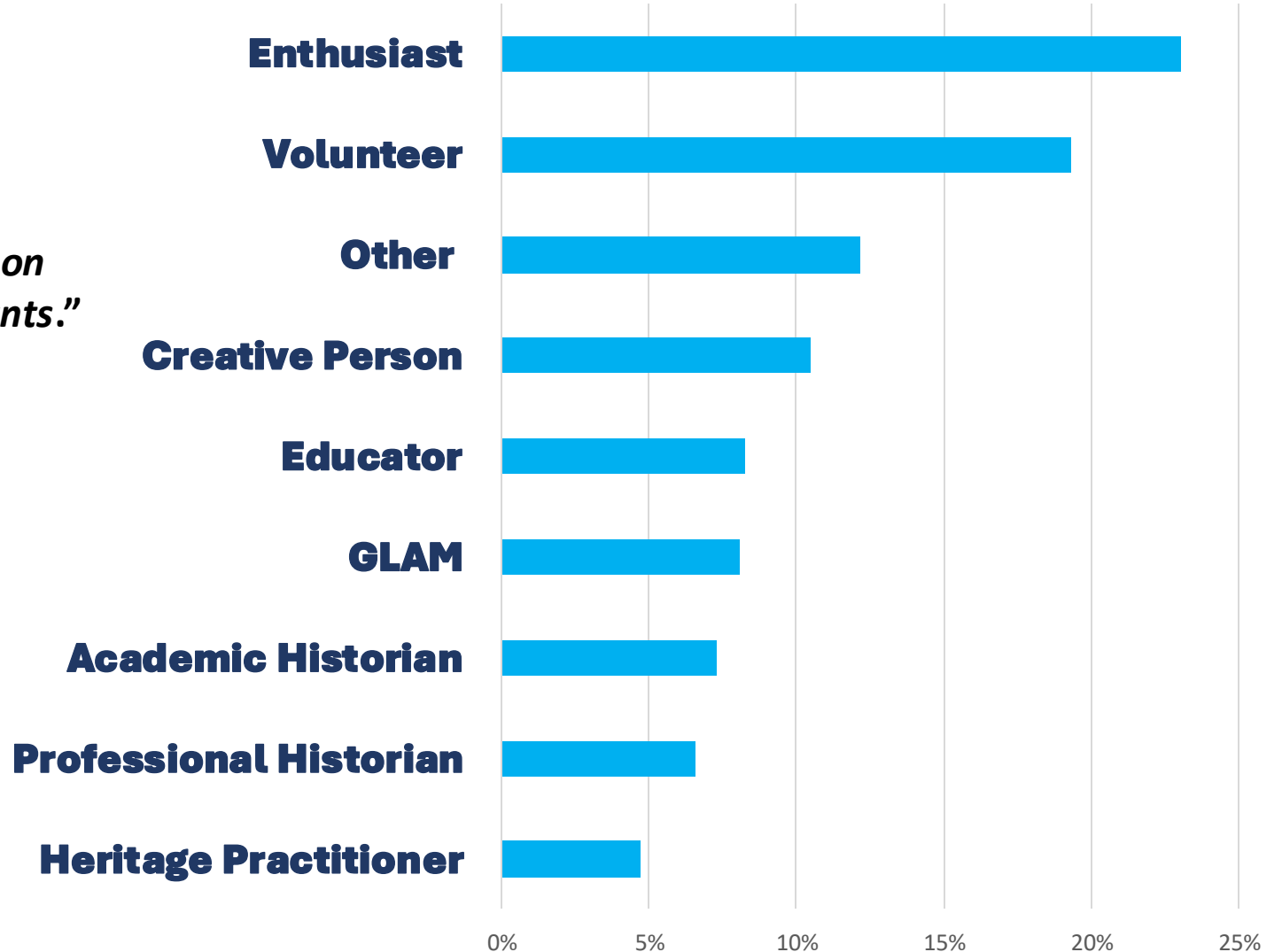

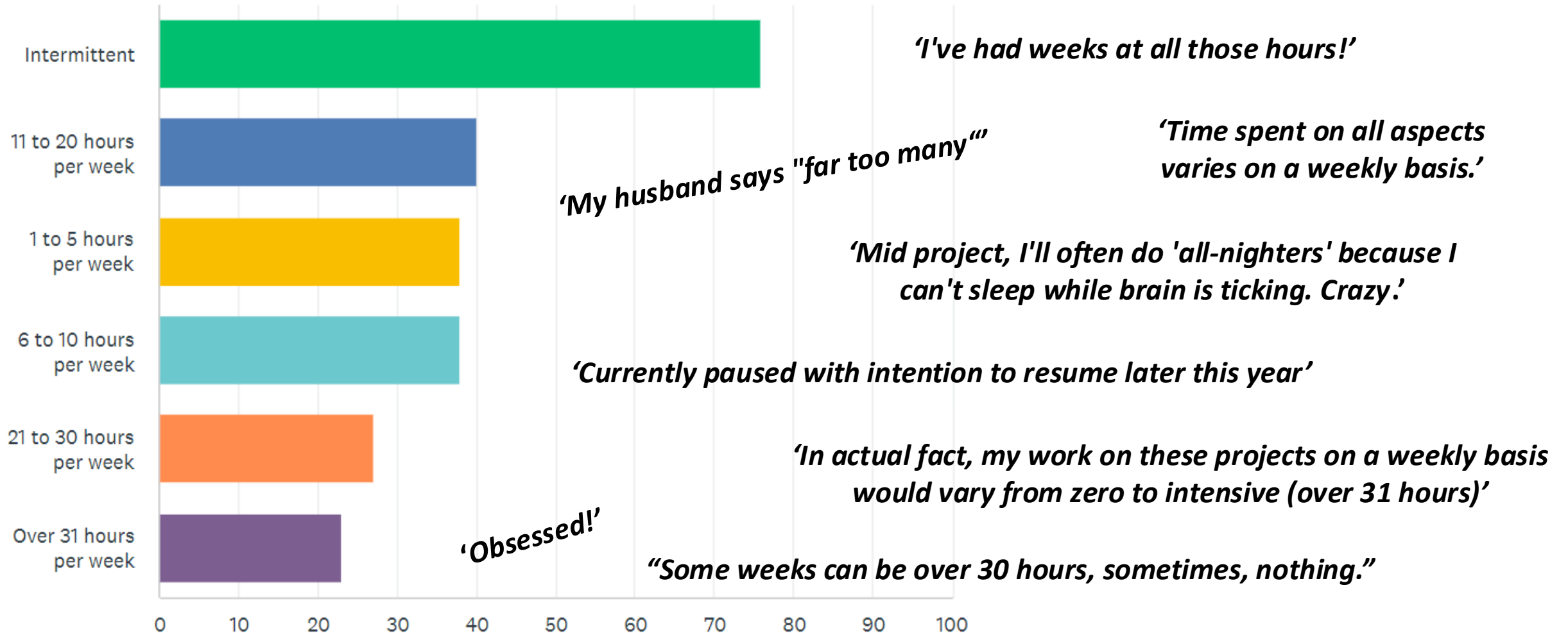

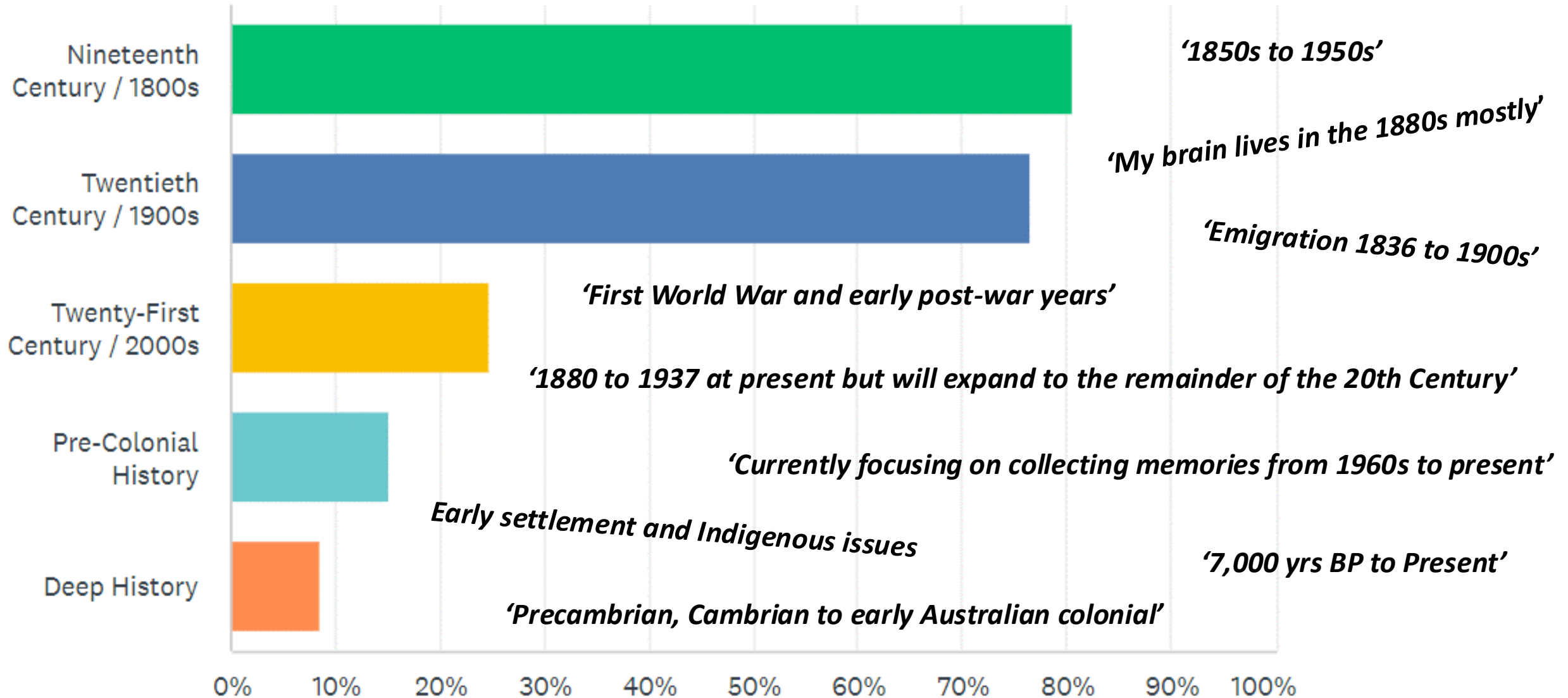


How many hours per week do you dedicate to your project/s?

In which era/s are you interested?

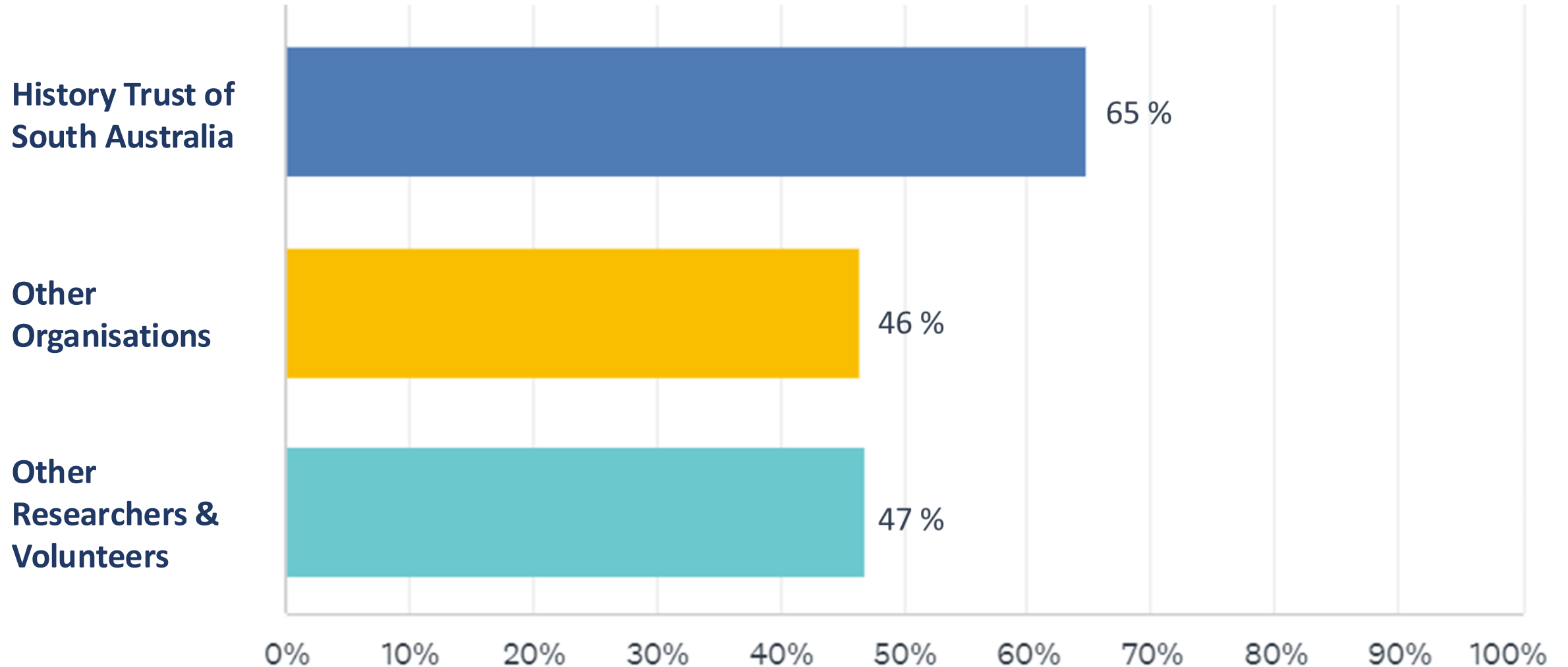

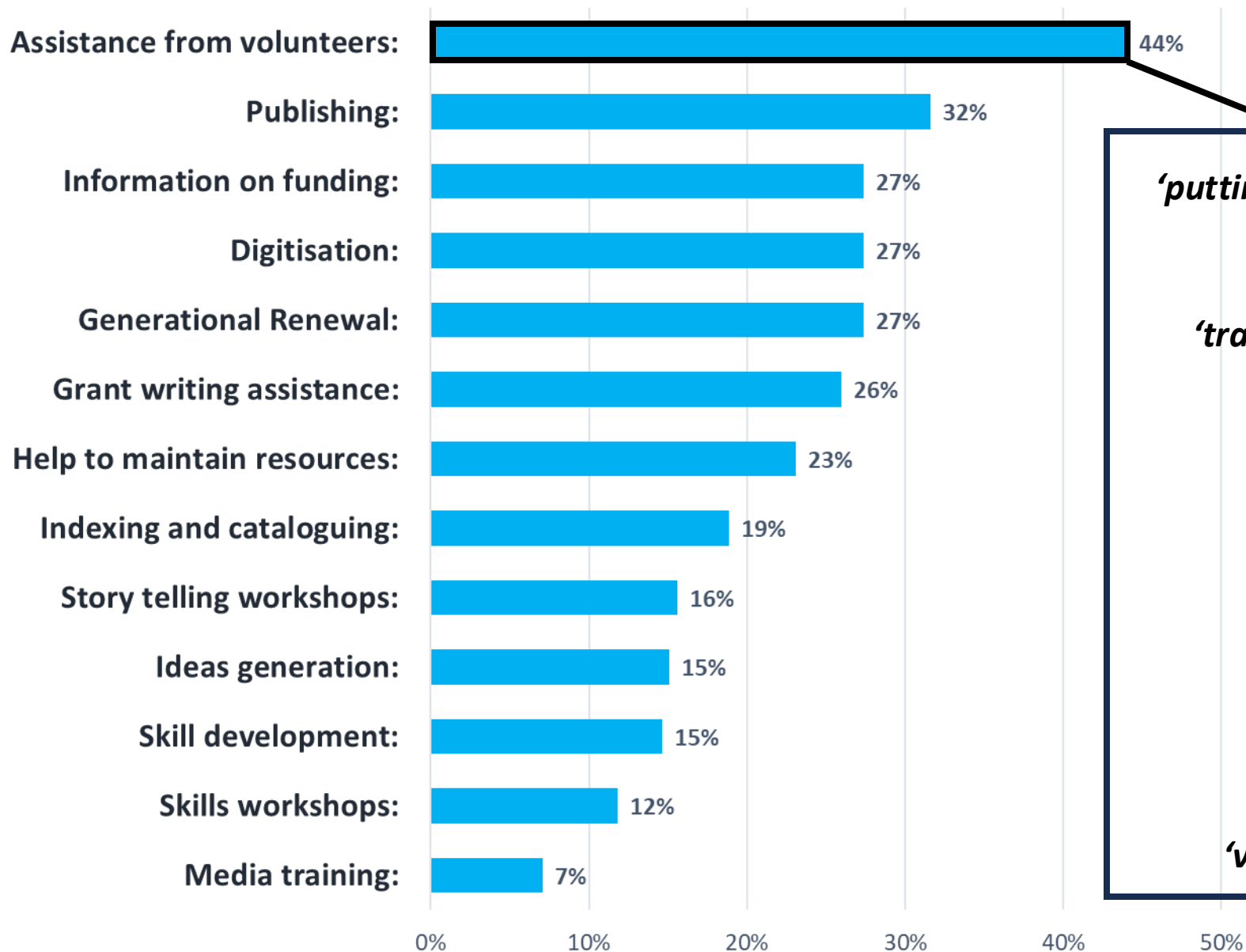

National Parks Code

- Plan your walk. Inform a responsible person of your proposed route and expected time of return.
- Wear sturdy shoes, a hat, sunscreen, insect repellent and carry basic first aid.
- Carry sufficient food and drinking water.
- Comply with all signs. Keep to formed trails, do not take short cuts or create new trails or use trails in wet and muddy conditions.
- Leave no trace or rubbish.
- Dogs must be on a lead, no longer than 3 metres at all times for the safety of your dog as well as the protection of native wildlife. Always clean up after your dog.
- Respect wildlife and other visitors to the Sanctuary Zone.
- Do not remove or disturb plants, rocks or cultural artefacts.

Saltmarsh Trail	Grade 2 <small>No bushwalking experience required. The track is a hardened or compacted surface and may have a gentle hill section or sections and occasional steps. Walks no greater than 15km.</small>	< 1 km 45 min walk	A family friendly walk. Spot Hessel's Shore Crabs in their marsh burrows and see juvenile fish swimming in the tidal creeks. Use the photo point 'Ph. Sloe' at the end of the trail to contribute to 'Citizen Science' photo point monitoring.

*Hikers can estimate the time required to walk a trail by using an average speed of 3 to 4 km per hour.

Murriippi Beach Saltmarsh Trail	Grade 2 <small>No bushwalking experience required. The track is a hardened or compacted surface and may have a gentle hill section or sections and occasional steps. Walks no greater than 15km.</small>	< 1 km 45 min walk	A family friendly walk to the beach and major tidal creek. Spot shorebirds feeding on the adjoining side. Access to the beach and tidal creek is by foot only on low tide. The marsh is inundated on high tide and remains wet in sections on low tide. Be prepared for muddy shoes.

SURVIVING ON THE STREETS: A digital history journey created by people who have lived without shelter

Welcome to this digital history journey! You will discover stories from people who – when they were young – lived in Adelaide's parks, beaches, youth shelters, cars and caravan parks.

This project was initiated and facilitated by Terence Connellan, who experienced unsheltered life for many years.

The stories included offer unique insights into the history of Adelaide and enrich local knowledge and understanding of what it's like to live without regular or secure shelter.

Importantly, the process of generating these videos has enabled participants to tell strong stories of getting through hard times. These stories celebrate their skills and the knowledge they developed through their experiences. People who live without shelter are often seen through a lens of deficit, or not seen or heard at all. Here, they share their own stories in their own ways.

Intriguingly, this digital history journey also highlights diverse experiences of locations you may be familiar with yourself. We are invited to see Adelaide through a different lens.



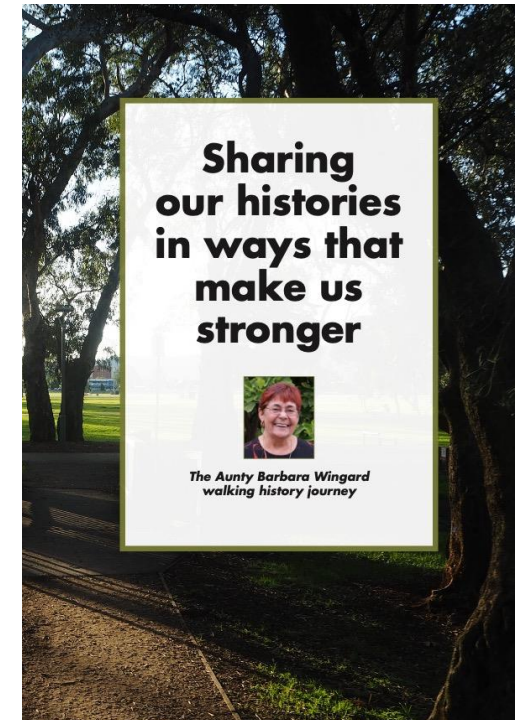
